OPIOID USE AND TREATMENT HISTORY INTERVIEW

- ◎ The opiate crisis
 - Prescription drug abuse is a “public health epidemic” -CDC
 - Leading cause of accidental deaths in the United States
- ◎ Concerns over opioid use within the community
 - Community concerns
 - Overdoses



OPIOID USE AND TREATMENT HISTORY INTERVIEW (CONT'D)

- Purpose was to learn more about the opiate using community as well as identify any possible patterns
- Collected data January 2015
- Community experts identified potential participants
- 62 participants
- Interview
 - 56-item inventory
 - Questions regarding:
 - Prescription Drugs
 - Methadone
 - Treatment
 - Community

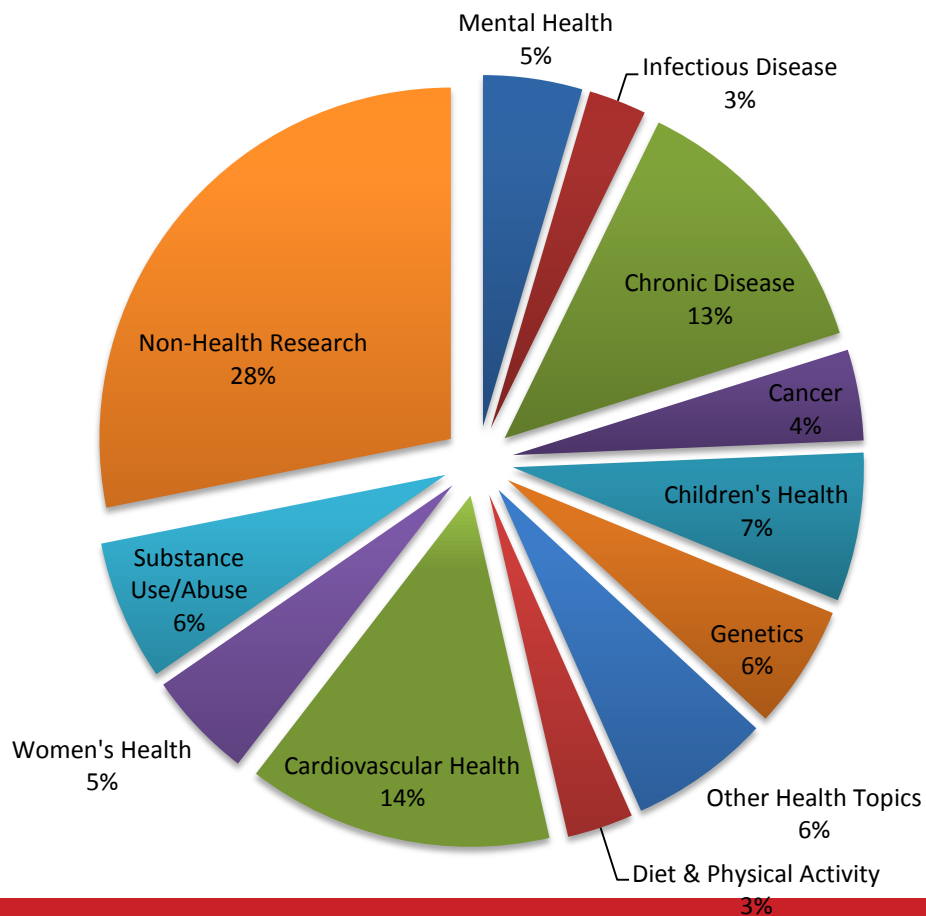

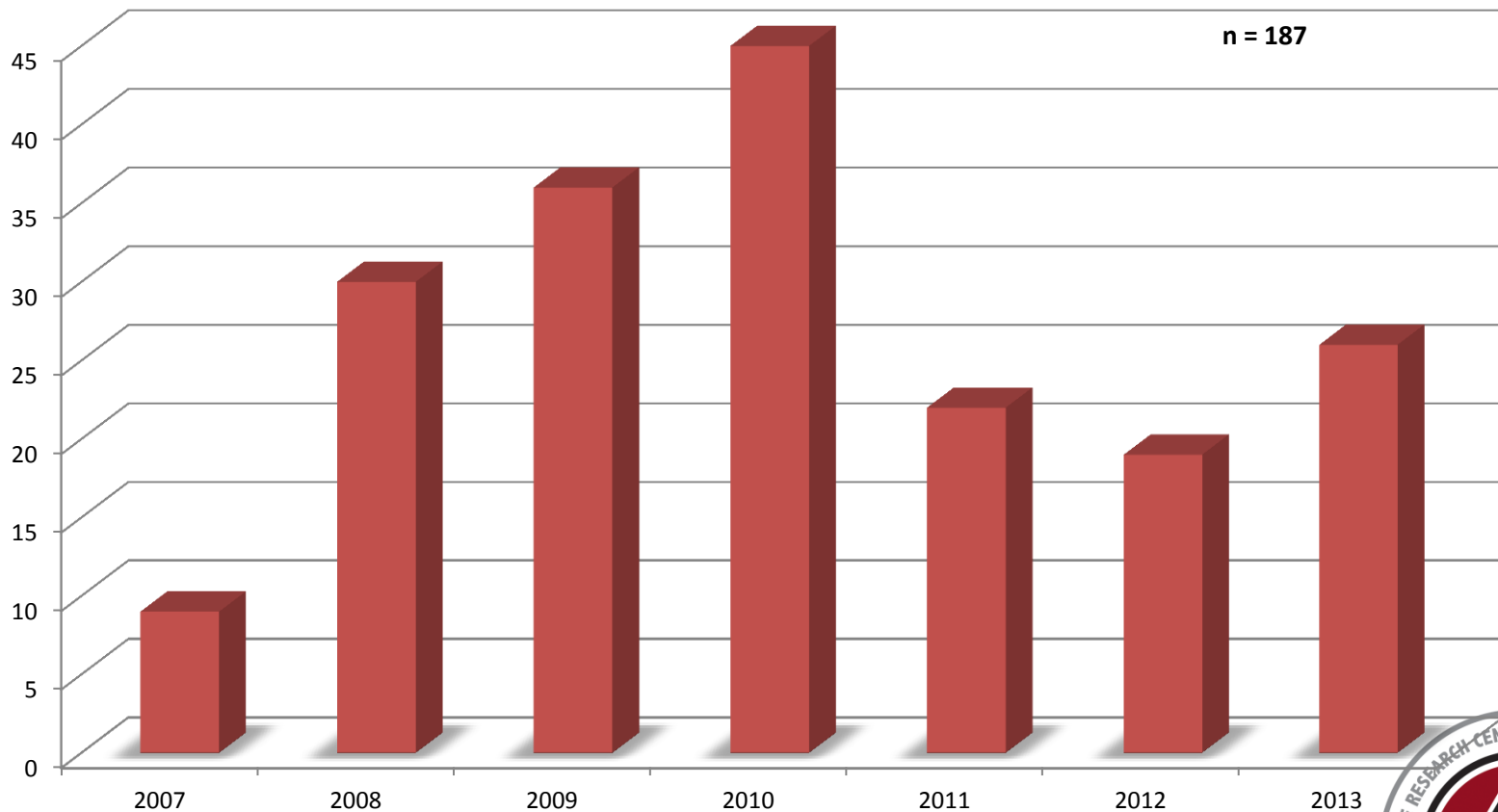
Electronic Library – Research Topics reviewed by OST 1994–2013

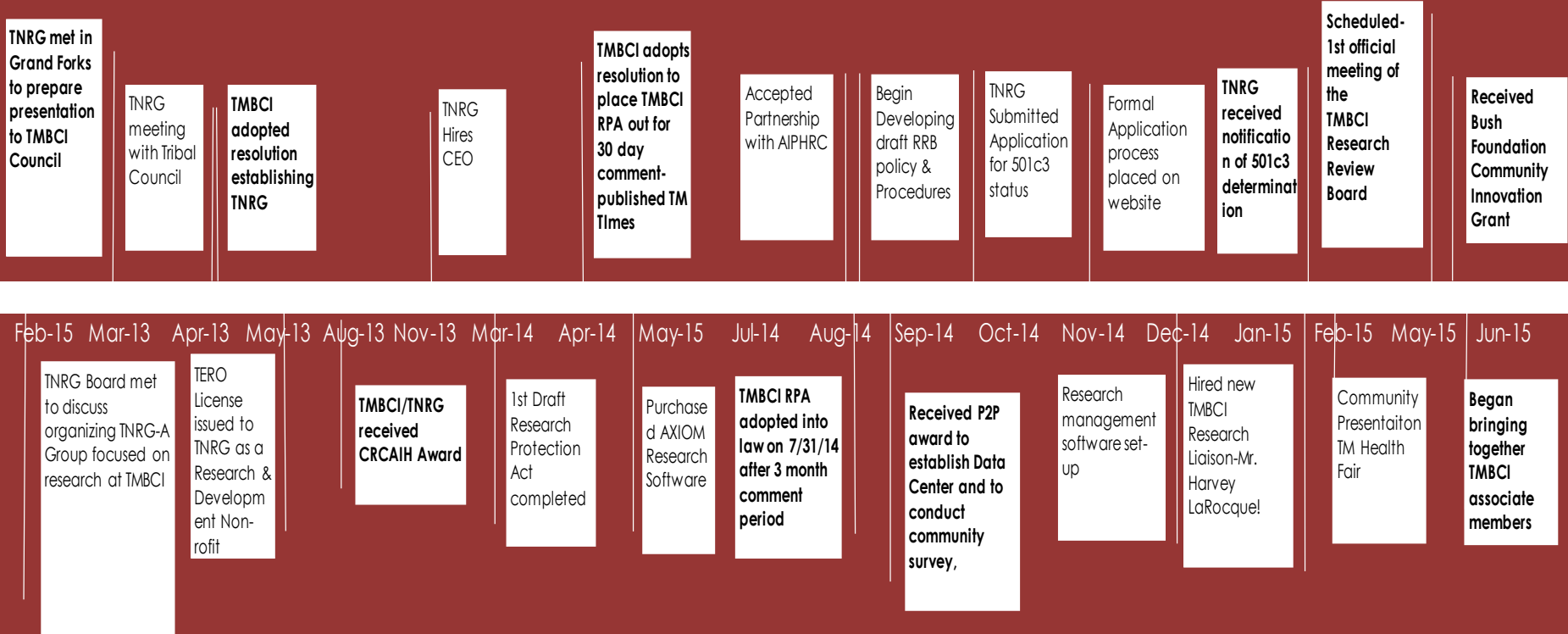

Research Review Board [RRB]?

- The body responsible for review and approval of all research studies on behalf of the Spirit Lake Tribe. A Tribally driven board with authority over all research.

Purpose of an RRB?

- Protection of Human Subjects, Animals, & Cultural resources in our tribal community.
- Ensure that research is conducted ethically and legally.
- Benefits vs. risks to our tribal community.

Mission of the RRB?

- To positively contribute to educational and scholarly activities within the community **THAT WILL BENEFIT THE TRIBE IN GENERAL.**

Assist in promoting good research that will benefit our community

Minimize potential risk

Ensure consent process fully informs volunteers

Maximizing potential benefit for our community

Ensure compliance of all regulations governing research
